Reserving a Program

Stop in to pick up a registration form or download and complete the home school program registration form that can be found on Heritage Hill's website (www.heritagehillgb.org). Send completed registration form along with payment to Heritage Hill no later than one week prior to the program date.

Cost for all programs, unless noted, is \$6 per student with one adult per family admitted for \$4. Additional adults pay \$10, passes or memberships are not valid.

Registration is filled on a first come, first served basis.

January 25: Playthings from the Past

From Jacob's Ladders to thaumatropes, learn about some favorite playthings from the past. Students will try their hand at parlor games as well as make a toy to take home.

February 15: Build a Log Cabin

Ages: 8 and up

In this interactive program, children discover the differences between historic saddle-notch and piece-sur-piece cabins by constructing small models of each. As they build, students learn about choices in roofing, chimneys, and building sites.

March 22: Women from Wisconsin II

Celebrate Women's History Month with some of Wisconsin's Amazing Women! In this program, students will learn about women from Wisconsin who made a difference in the lives of people around them.

April 12: Fashion through History

From the practical to impractical, students will see how fashionable clothing has evolved over time. They will have the opportunity to try on clothing just like our interpreters wear, as well as see other popular styles!

May 3: Spring Tours

9am-3pm (start and end times are flexible)

All ages are welcome

This popular field trip offers your students a great overview of Wisconsin history from the 17th to the 20th centuries. Create your own experience by visiting buildings in the order that you choose, and interact with our interpreters as you please. Critical thinking is needed as interpreters ask kids to imagine life as a farmer, tradesman, fur trader, and soldier.

June 14: Fire & Fun in a Small Town

Ages: 3 and up

Meet the town's blacksmith, and watch him twist red-hot iron. Children will then help the volunteer fire department put out a "fire" before they play historic games and make a special toy to take home.

July 19: Bienvenue a La Baye

Explore a time when Wisconsin was La Baye and many locals were fur traders. Children will see and taste popcorn popped over an open fire, tour the fur trade cabin, play Native American games, and sing voyageur songs.

August 23: World War I

It's been 100 years since the United States entered World War I. Students will learn about some unique soldiers who served in World War I, the importance of camouflage, study some literature, learn what life was like during the war, and more!

September 20: Encounter Fort Howard

9:30-12 **Note: this is a 2.5 hour program

Students will abide by strict rules while they experience life at a Wisconsin military outpost: Fort Howard in 1836! Students will examine the soldiers' regimented days, practice marching and participate in an 1830s school lesson.

October 11: Spies and Espionage

Heritage Hill invites kids to become a spy for the day as they learn about tactics that spies have used throughout history, up to the creation of the CIA.

November 15: A Pilgrim's Voyage

Through story, critical thinking and hands-on experiences, students learn about the hardships of settlement at Plymouth in the 17th century. Students may try on period clothing and sample Pilgrim bread.

December 6: Victorian Christmas

By the end of the Victorian Era, Christmas had become a popular holiday with many of the traditions that we still celebrate today. Students will discover the roots of some of our most popular holiday practices while also learning how to be proper Victorian ladies and gentlemen.
