Hospital This building housed active duty soldiers and their families.

Soldiers reported to this room to receive their Officer's daily orders, which often included chopping Quarters wood, hauling water, and building roads.

If you were an unmarried enlisted soldier, you Detached reported to this room for your meals.

This building is where soldiers could go for Schoolhouse medical care, although sometimes treatment did more harm than good.

Located outside the walls of the Fort, military **Orderly Room** and civilian children could go here to learn.




